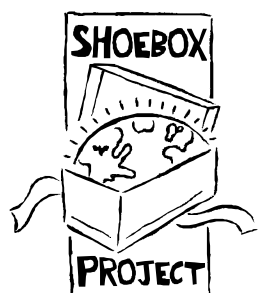

Next, you fill out the form and enclose \$7.00 to cover the cost of postage.

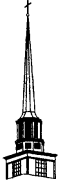
Last, bring it to church on or before November 9th and put it in the box in the narthex or the west wing lobby.

The program will be led by Maxine Mast. All women are invited to attend.

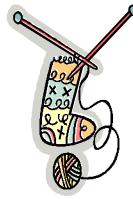
UMW READING GROUP Nov. 11, 10 am in the parlor

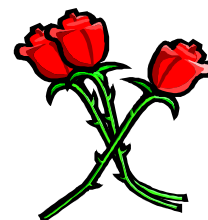

STEWARDSHIP CORNER

If we want to be good stewards, the way is plain. First of all, let us give ourselves to Christ. The love of Christ within us will change us forever.



I am thankful for all your prayers and support during my recent defibrillator shocks. Tests indicate that my heart is in rhythm and the ICD (Implanted Cardiac Defibrillator) is ready to provide shocks again when needed (prayerfully never.) Now on to other things.

I am often asked, “How much should I give to the church?” In Methodist thought, that’s the wrong question. The question should be “What is my response to God?” What does my faith and relationship to Jesus Christ tell me to do? How grateful are we for what He has done in our lives? God tells us in His Word what He expects as a response. In Genesis 29:22 it says, “Of all that **You give me**, I will surely give one-tenth to you.” One-tenth of income is called the “tithe.” This should be the goal for every Christian. But because of financial situations and bad financial decisions people make, this is often not feasible at this time, but it still should be the goal. So, the question becomes, “How can I get to a tithe?” We can do that by making a commitment to “proportionate giving” (the setting of a percentage of income to give) as an expression of our love and gratitude to the God who created and sustains us. One place to begin is to take a look at what your percentage giving is right now. Then, each year increase the percentage as you can until you reach the 10% tithe. You may increase ½% or 1%. 2% or more next year. In doing this, you are putting yourself in a position to grow spiritually, if the percentage is a sacrifice. We should not lower our percentage because we selfishly want some more “things” or desire a more luxurious vacation or car. The hard question is, what lifestyle adjustment(s) do I need to make in order to give to God what I know I should be doing to express my gratitude? Ask God to lead you and then, by faith, work out a plan: be regular in your giving and give proportionately. Yes, the end result will be that the church’s budgetary needs will be met, but something greater will also have taken place. You will grow spiritually and in your relationship with God, because giving is “A Matter of the Heart.” The greatest hindrance to spiritual growth among Christians today is financial stewardship. Jesus talked about this subject more than any other because He knew it would be our greatest challenge. I would encourage you to take the time to consider a plan for your stewardship that will follow a Biblical model and put you in a position to grow spiritually. May God guide you in this life changing decision.

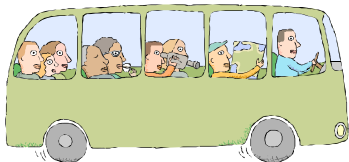
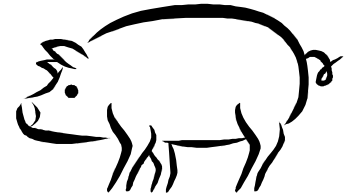
Methodist Men's Barbecue

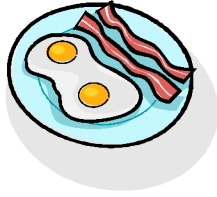

E-GIVING AVAILABLE

Lewisville UMC offers the option of E-Giving (Electronic Giving). Persons can have contributions to the General Fund or Building Fund electronically drafted from their bank account on the 15th or end of each month (or both). A number of families have already chosen this option.
