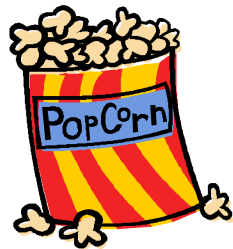

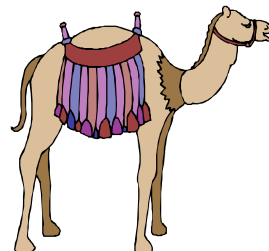

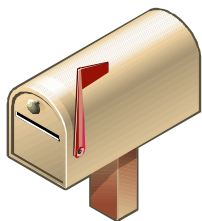
JOB LOSS SUPPORT GROUP

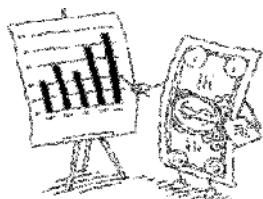

STEWARDSHIP CORNER

“But you, Bethlehem Ephrathah.....out of you will come for Me, One Who will be ruler over Israel,” (Micah 5:2), so wrote the prophet Micah some 750 years before Jesus' birth took place. Have you ever waited for a prayer to be answered? Have you waited 750 years? Does your circumstance seem impossible? Think about the circumstances surrounding Jesus' birth. The young woman God chose to be His mother didn't even live in Bethlehem. Solution? Put a bug in the ruler's ear; have him call for a census. Mary and Joseph are on their way. The rest is history! Perhaps you're in an obscure place, waiting to be used by God. Your wait is not in vain. God isn't through yet, and He has a plan for you, too!



Sometimes I am asked, "Why was Jesus born in Bethlehem?" Of course, it was the home of Joseph and Mary's ancestors - the city of David. But it was more. The literal meaning of the city's name of Bethlehem, is "the house of bread." Two things come to my mind about the significance of this. The first is that bread is one of life's most common things. God wanted His Son to identify with all persons. Jesus was born like many of those in His day, not in royal palaces, but in a common way. He experienced birth just as we do and grew just as we do. Jesus is like us in this way and so He can understand the type things we all go through in life.

The second thing is what Jesus said in John 6:35, "I am the bread of life; he who comes to me shall not hunger." Jesus was born in Bethlehem to feed us, to satisfy our spiritual hunger. Bread is a good comparison to our Lord because He satisfies, gratifies and strengthens us spiritually, just as bread does physically. But many are eating at the wrong table. It's easy to get caught up in searching for meaning in life from the wrong things, because there are a lot of things that bring temporary happiness. But only Christ satisfies the eternal dimension of the human spirit. 1 Corinthians 1:17 says that "we are all partakers of that one bread." That "one bread" is Christ. He is the only bread that offers life and the decision to receive Him is an individual one. "But as many as received Him, to them gave He power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on His name." (John 1:12). When an individual decides to receive Jesus into their lives, Jesus enters them spiritually like bread enters us physically. Jesus was born in the city of bread that each and every one of us might be fed spiritually. This Advent, do you need to be fed spiritually? Come and join us in worship as we are fed together.

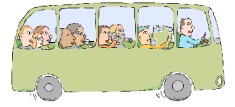

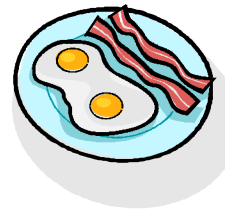

END OF YEAR CONTRIBUTIONS

Federal law requires that all contributions to LUMC must be either in our hands by December 31st or, if mailed, post-marked on or before December 31st in order to qualify the giver for a tax deduction in 2009.

Gifts received which don’t meet these requirements will be gratefully accepted and credited to 2010.

CHARGE CONFERENCE IS DECEMBER 8

Charge Conference is an historic meeting presided over by our District Superintendent, Bill Medlin. The annual meeting will be Tuesday, December 8, at 7:00 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall. At the Charge Conference, we review the work of Lewisville UMC and make decisions on items that relate Lewisville Church to the Western North Carolina Annual Conference and the larger United Methodist Church. All persons are welcome to attend; however, only members of the Administrative Board are voting members of the Charge Conference.

THIS YEAR all churches are being asked to present their plans for participation in the "Power of 3 for WNCC." Here's what this is:

Bishop Goodpaster has set forth a three-year vision for the Western North Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church. This vision revolves around the number 3 and presents a challenge to all congregations and members to work toward these goals. The goals are as follows:

300,000 members in the Western NC Conference - This goal challenges all of our churches to increase our membership.

30,000 more people in worship - This goal challenges us to increase our worship attendance.

3,000 mission teams sent in the name of Christ into the world - This goal challenges us to become more involved in building teams and other mission opportunities.

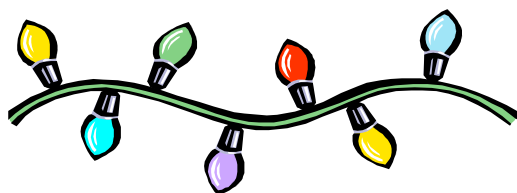
300 resurrected churches (those that are stagnant or in decline) - This goal challenges them to become revitalized with our help.

30 new faith communities - Congregational Development will be working on establishing new churches. Our challenge is to provide prayer and financial support as we are able.

3 years - all in the next three years.

Among the many reports we submit at the Charge Conference will be a new report form asking for our congregation's commitment to these goals for the coming year. We are asked to project our membership goal, to project a vision goal for worship attendance, project mission teams involved in hands-on projects, and we are asked to commit our prayers and financial support for revitalized churches and new faith communities.

According to our bishop these are "strategic, measurable goals that can be achieved if all of us together unite in common effort to follow Jesus, make disciples, and transform the world. What will be needed? Creativity, commitment, and intentional efforts to practice the faith we proclaim. For now, I hope that you will lift these goals in prayer and that you will renew personal commitments to live as faithful, fruitful disciples daily."

2009 YEAR-END GIVING OPPORTUNITIES

As we remember God's greatest gift to us, His Son, the Christmas season can be a time to offer gratitude for His grace by making a special gift to the church. Additionally, since tax laws intentionally encourage charitable giving, individuals who itemize their deductions can further reduce income taxes for 2009 if a gift is made by December 31st.

HOW MIGHT YOU GIVE? - Sometimes gifts at year-end are lump sum contributions. Often gifts at year-end are second mile gifts, over and above your regular contribution which can help the church fulfill or even expand its mission commitments and serve the Kingdom of God more abundantly. To honor a loved one or to honor the memory of a loved one with a gift to your church is a very appropriate and meaningful way to give thanks for that person and celebrate their life during this holiday season. **Remember also special gifts to our Building Fund.**

WHAT CAN YOU GIVE?

A Gift of Cash: This is the simplest and most flexible way to make a gift. Many have found great joy in giving to the church if they receive a year-end bonus. If you use cash, be sure to use an offering envelope with your name and address on it so that your gift will be credited to you on your yearly statement. **If you write a check it must be dated 2009 and postmarked or received by December 31, 2009.**

A Gift of Appreciated Securities and Stocks. It is our church's policy to sell gifts of stock upon receipt. By gifting them directly to your church, you will receive a charitable deduction for the fair market value of the assets on the date of the gift, and you will avoid any federal capital gains tax that would otherwise be due on the sale of that asset. However, if your securities are worth less now than when you purchased them, you may be better off to sell them first, take the capital loss on your tax return, then contribute the proceeds. The combined amount of the deductible loss and the charitable deduction may total more than the current value of the investment but plan ahead. Gifts of stock and securities take time to process so **this should be done early in December.**

Gifts from a Retirement Account: If you are over the age of 59½ and have an IRA or other tax-favored retirement account, you may prefer to withdraw an amount sufficient to fund your charitable gifts for the year. Although you will normally report the income on your tax return when you itemize your deductions, you are entitled to a corresponding deduction for the amount of the gift. This can result in a "wash" for tax purposes, with no tax owed on the amount withdrawn. Check with your tax advisor to see if this would be a beneficial way for you to make a gift this year.

*****IRA ROLLOVER GIFTS: A UNIQUE TAXWISE METHOD OF GIVING IN 2009.**

Congress extended the rules for charitable gifts made from IRAs through 2009. If you are over 70½, Federal tax laws allow you to make a gift from your IRA to a charity without claiming any increased income or paying any additional tax. This tax free rollover gift can be any amount up to \$100,000 in one year. Consult with your professional tax advisor and your IRA custodian to see how a charitable "IRA Rollover" could be a taxwise gift to give to your church this year.

PRAYER LIST GUIDELINES

Lewisville UMC publishes a weekly Prayer List that is made available at both worship services. Person(s) can be added or deleted by calling the church office, 945-3203. Prayer requests are **dated** when placed on the Prayer List and kept on for three months unless updated. Requests can stay on the Prayer List as long as needed, but we ask that it be updated every three months to keep our list up to date.

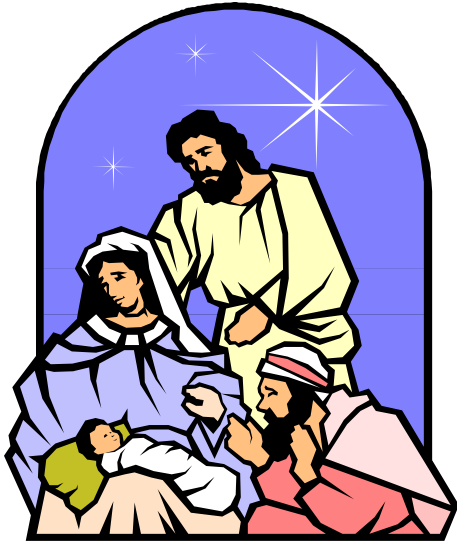
